MOTION: by Ms. Pemberton to pull Ordinance 2025-28 *An Ordinance Amending CBJC 42.20.090, Disorderly Conduct* for further discussion and to approve the consent agenda as amended and asked for unanimous consent. ***Hearing no objection, motion passed.***

The committee held a robust discussion regarding Ordinance 2025-28, highlighting the systemic, and direct, racism issues they saw within the ordinance. Chief of Police Derek Bos was in attendance and answered various questions committee members had. He also walked the committee through current police practice when trying to issue a trespass, or other disorderly citations, to someone vs how this ordinance, if passed, would streamline and speed up that process.

The committee agreed they wanted to send a recommendation to the Assembly and decided to hold a worksession on August 12th to continue discussion on Ordinance 2025-28 and allow time to write up a recommendation for inclusion in the August 18 Regular Assembly agenda, which has this ordinance up for Public Hearing.

MOTION: by Mr. Nance to hold Ordinance 2025-28 *An Ordinance Amending CBJC 42.20.090, Disorderly Conduct* in committee for further discussion and to forward all other ordinances to the Assembly for action and asked for unanimous consent. ***Hearing no objection, motion passed.***

ORDINANCE OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF JUNEAU, ALASKA

Serial No. 2025-28

An Ordinance Amending CBJC 42.20.090, Disorderly Conduct.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF JUNEAU, ALASKA:

Section 1. Classification. This ordinance is of a general and permanent nature and shall become a part of the City and Borough of Juneau Municipal Code.

Section 2. Amendment of Section. CBJC 42.20.090, Disorderly conduct, is amended to read:

42.20.090 Disorderly conduct.

(a) It is unlawful for a person to:

- (1) In a public or private place, challenge another to fight or engage in fighting other than in self-defense or in the defense of a third person under circumstances which would be justified under AS 11.81.340;
- (2) At the scene of a fire or accident or in a public place where a crime has occurred, fail to comply with the lawful order of a peace or fire officer to leave the scene or place;
- (3) Sit, ~~or~~ lie, stand, walk, or camp on any public street, public path, public parking lot, or public parking garage in such a manner as to interfere with the free passage of pedestrian, bicycle, or vehicle traffic;

- 2 (4) In that part of the street which is designated or set aside for vehicle use,
- 3 including a pedestrian crosswalk stand in such a manner as to interfere with the
- 4 free and unimpeded use of the street by vehicles;
- 5
- 6 (5) On a public sidewalk, public stairwell, public path, or other public way intended
- 7 for pedestrian use, sit, lie, stand, or walk, or camp in such a manner that another
- 8 person may not easily pass without leaving the sidewalk, stairwell, path, or way
- 9 ~~after being requested to move in order to create room for another person to pass~~
- 10 ~~or having been informed that they are blocking the sidewalk or way;~~
- 11
- 12 (6) While on grounds adjacent to a building in which school is in session, knowingly
- 13 create any noise or diversion which materially disrupts class work or otherwise
- 14 substantially interferes with the peace and good order of the school after being
- 15 informed by a school employee or a peace officer that their conduct is having such
- 16 an effect;
- 17
- 18 (7) Act in a manner, including throwing an object, under circumstances or in a
- 19 manner whereby the person or property of another is placed in danger of injury,
- 20 damage, or destruction;
- 21
- 22 (8) Knowingly provoke or encourage or attempt to provoke one or more persons
- 23 present to hostile or violent reactions under circumstances where a clear and
- 24 present danger of unjustified violence exists;
- 25
- (9) No person shall urinate or defecate or intentionally expose the buttock or anus to
another person, in or upon any street, sidewalk, alley, plaza, park, public
building, public property, public or private parking lot, or in any place open to

2 the public or exposed to the public view. This section shall not apply to urination
3 or defecation utilizing appropriate fixtures in any restroom or other facility
4 designed for the sanitary disposal of human waste.

6 (b) In this section the following words and phrases have the following meanings:

7 (1) *Lawful order*. An order shall be a lawful order if it is one which is given where
8 the person's presence, conduct or speech significantly impedes an officer in the
9 performance of official duties in effecting an arrest, in investigating a crime or
10 possible crime, in investigating or assisting at an accident, in ensuring or
11 securing public safety and similar acts where the presence, conduct or speech of
12 the person is not constitutionally protected.
13

14 (2) *Public place* means a place where the public is permitted to assemble, enter or
15 pass through, whether publicly or privately maintained, including streets,
16 sidewalks, parks, places of accommodation, transportation, business and
17 entertainment, or any other places or premises which by their physical nature,
18 function, custom, usage, notice, or lack thereof would cause a reasonable person
19 to believe that no permission to enter or remain is required.
20

21 (c) Violating 42.20.090(a)(1)—(a)(8) is a Class B misdemeanor. A court may not impose a
22 sentence of imprisonment for a definite term (i) of more than 72 hours for a person
23 convicted of disorderly conduct under 42.20.090(a)(1)—(a)(8) if the offense is a first
24 conviction and (ii) not more than ten days if the offense is a second or subsequent
25 conviction. Disorderly conduct under 42.20.090(a)(9) is an infraction punishable by a
fine of \$150.00.

Section 3. Effective Date. This ordinance shall be effective 30 days after its adoption.
